Anaphora

 Repetition of the same word or group of words at the beginning of successive clauses, sentences, or lines.

- "Yesterday, the Japanese government also launched an attack against Malaya. Last night, Japanese forces attacked Hong Kong. Last night, Japanese forces attacked Guam. Last night, Japanese forces attacked the Philippine Islands. Last night, the Japanese attacked Wake Island. And this morning, the Japanese attacked Midway Island."

Antistrophe

 Ending a series of lines, phrases, clauses, or sentences with the same word or words.

Antistrophe Example

"I said you're afraid to bleed. [As] long as the white man sent you to Korea, you bled. He sent you to Germany, you bled. He sent you to the South Pacific to fight the Japanese, you bled. You bleed for white people. But when it comes time to seeing your own churches being bombed and little black girls be[ing] murdered, you haven't got no blood."

Antistrophe Example

Antistrophe Example

Symploce

 The combination of anaphora and antistrophe: beginning a series of lines, clauses, or sentences with the same word or phrase while simultaneously repeating a different word or phrase at the end of each element in this series

Symploce Example

 Much of what I say might sound like it's stirring up trouble, but it's the truth.
 Much of what I say might sound like it is hate, but it's the truth."

Symploce Example
